To get this right, we've delivered a plan for the future, listening to clinicians, empowering local decision-making, and adhering to proper health infrastructure planning and processes.

Queenslanders deserve to have a health system they can rely on, and that's why we're delivering the *Hospital Rescue Plan*.


Queensland's hospitals are the backbone of the health system, helping our hardworking health workforce to care for more than a million people each year.


When the Capacity Expansion Program (CEP) was announced in 2022, it followed eight years of underinvestment in health infrastructure in Queensland. As our population grew, our hospitals were struggling to keep up with demand. The health system was in crisis.

Infrastructure suffered, needing \$2 billion in maintenance and repair alone.

Ambulance ramping was the highest it has ever been, and unprecedented numbers of people were left lingering on surgery wait lists.







Independent Review of the CEP

The decision to develop the Capacity Expansion Program (CEP) was a hurried attempt to address the state of crisis gripping the health system.

As issues emerged across the CEP, including significant project delays and increased costs, the new Queensland Government announced an independent review in 2024. The Independent Review into the CEP (the Review) found extensive evidence that the planning and execution of the CEP lacked in many critical areas.

Poor planning

- **x** The CEP was assembled in around six weeks, a process that under regular circumstances would have taken around six months of detailed planning for each project.
- x Business cases were not completed prior to announced budgets.
- x Projects were developed without consulting clinicians and considering local priorities.
- x Critical services were left out of projects due to a lack of consultation and planning.

Low productivity

- x Contractors and subcontractors were required to apply Best Practice Industry Conditions (BPIC) a major contributor to project cost blowouts and delays.
- **x** Because of BPIC, Queensland construction sites are less productive than the rest of the country.
- **x** On just one project, the impact of BPIC is estimated to contribute more than \$130 million in additional costs.

Rushed delivery

- **x** Rushed contracting without proper planning saw projects blow out by 75% within months, requiring an additional \$1 billion.
- x The plan unrealistically attempted to deliver all major projects in a single stage.

Delays

The Review found that every project in the CEP was underfunded, delayed, did not deliver on critical service needs and was ultimately undeliverable. In some cases, projects had doubled in cost and were delayed from anywhere between six months to more than three years. Without major intervention, none of the projects were able to be delivered in their current form.

Cost blowouts

Because of poor planning, low productivity, rushed delivery, and delays, costs blew out by approximately \$7 billion.



We are embarking on the *Hospital Rescue Plan* to deliver modern, world-class facilities across the State and to tackle problems like the record-high levels of ambulance ramping and elective surgery waitlists.

This credible plan gives clinicians the tools and resources they need to do their job, while giving Queenslanders the health services they need by increasing capacity and expanding services at hospitals right across the State.







The Prince Charles Hospital

Located in Brisbane's north, The Prince Charles Hospital is a major tertiary-level cardiac hospital, employing around 3,200 staff and providing specialised care for more than 420,000 Queenslanders each year.

Our expansion project will deliver better services for the people of Brisbane, making sure they can receive healthcare faster and avoid potential complications while left on a waitlist without answers.

The Hospital Rescue Plan will deliver:

- ✓ At least 93 new overnight beds
- ✓ A new, fully developed plan that meets Hospital and Health Service and clinical needs
- Services including a new emergency department, paediatrics and operating theatres
- ✓ Staged execution to keep the project on track
- Better use of the site, leveraging nearby facilities and infrastructure
- ✓ A multi-storey car park delivered in 2025.

- x \$488 million cost blowout
- x Delayed at least 18 months
- x Missing and inadequate planning documents
- x No paediatric emergency department short stay, no expansion space for operating theatres and no full sterilising department
- x Unresolved design issues
- **x** No plan to reduce costs by partnering with the private hospital on the same site.





New Queensland Cancer Centre

Cancer remains one of the leading causes of death and a leading cause of reduced quality of life for Queenslanders of all ages and backgrounds.

population, cancer diagnoses are only expected to increase. Not all Queenslanders have access to the right cancer support when they need it.

The new Queensland Cancer Centre at the Herston Health Precinct will provide Queenslanders with access to contemporary and world-leading therapies. The centre of excellence will also enable greater 'home-grown' research and its translation into local health solutions. To manage growing cancer service demand, the Queensland Government will take the necessary steps to ensure quality cancer care is accessible to all Queenslanders, no matter where they live.

New Toowoomba Hospital

Toowoomba has a growing and ageing population, which is increasing pressure on our hospitals and health services each year.

As more people are choosing to call Toowoomba and the Darling Downs home, our new Toowoomba Hospital will ensure every Queenslander has access to care, closer to where they live. The new Toowoomba Hospital will be the main referral hospital for the Darling Downs region and will provide a much-needed boost to bed capacity alongside emergency and specialised care.

New Coomera Hospital

The Gold Coast is one of the most rapidly growing regions in Queensland, and more beds at the new Coomera Hospital will provide care closer to home while taking pressure off the already busy local health system.

Experts from the Gold Coast Hospital and Health Service identified the greatest priority for the region to be increasing capacity and bolstering services at the Coomera site, rather than fragmenting services across different facilities, as was the case under the previous plan. It's why the Queensland Government will deliver an uplift of 50% to deliver 600 more beds at the new Coomera Hospital.

The Hospital Rescue Plan will deliver:

- ✓ At least 600 new overnight beds
- ✓ Services including day surgery, maternity, operating theatres and an ICU
- ✓ Works on site to progress while planning continues
- ✓ A revised masterplan to better connect to public transport

Mackay Hospital Expansion

These communities are growing and deserve care closer to home, so we're delivering a major expansion to the hospital. More beds and services at Mackay Base Hospital will make sure locals have access to safe, high-quality care.

The Hospital Rescue Plan will deliver:

- x \$270 million cost blowout, more than double the announced budget
- x Delayed more than a year
- x No rooftop helipad and no backup electricity
- x No agreement on clinical needs
- **x** No parent accommodation in the paediatric service
- **x** Late identification of asbestos and cultural heritage artefacts
- x Major design flaws not rectified.

Townsville University Hospital Expansion

Townsville University Hospital is the only tertiary referral centre in North Queensland, treating patients from as far north as Cape York Peninsula and the Torres Strait Islands and west to Mount Isa and the Gulf of Carpentaria.

Each year, it treats hundreds of thousands of Queenslanders in acute, outpatient, community, and aged care settings with focus on quality, safety, and compassion. Our expansion project at Townsville will deliver more services for locals closer to home, making sure they get the care they deserve, when they need it.

The Hospital Rescue Plan will deliver:

- ✓ At least 165 new overnight beds
- ✓ Services including day surgery, operating theatres and a rehab therapy unit
- ✓ A new, fully developed plan that meets Hospital and Health Service and clinical needs
- ✓ A staged approach to keep the project on track
- ✓ A fast-tracked multi-storey car park with opportunities for local builders.

New Bundaberg Hospital

Bundaberg Hospital is one of the busiest hospitals in Wide Bay.

With a growing and ageing population, the new Bundaberg Hospital is an essential project to make sure Queenslanders living in our regions have easier access to specialised health services. Increasing bed capacity and improving access to healthcare in Bundaberg will ensure community needs continue to be met, now and in the future.

The Hospital Rescue Plan will deliver:

- ✓ A multi-storey car park.

Cairns Hospital Expansion

Cairns Hospital is the only major referral hospital in Far North Queensland. The people of Cairns deserve a world-class health system and services closer to home.

The hospital expansion will deliver the much-needed bed capacity and surgical services at Cairns Hospital, making it easier for Queenslanders to get the care they need.

The Hospital Rescue Plan will deliver:

- ✓ 64 new overnight beds by 2027
- At least 40 new overnight beds at the surgical centre
- Services including orthopaedics, ophthalmology, and plastic and reconstructive surgery
- Collaboration with local tertiary education providers for a future health and innovation precinct
- Funding to find a new and safe location for the Cairns Hospital helipad
- ✓ A multi-storey car park.

- x No funding for multi-storey car park.

Logan Hospital Expansion

Logan is a fast-growing city, so it is critical that bed capacity and health services can keep up with the community's needs.

The Logan Hospital expansion project is one of the largest in Queensland, delivering much needed upgrades and enhancements to buildings and services to make it easier for the people of Logan to access healthcare faster, and closer to home.

The Hospital Rescue Plan will deliver:

Rockhampton

That's why we are delivering new, expanded and upgraded infrastructure for Rockhampton to ensure the provision of safe, high-quality healthcare, closer to home.

Rockhampton Hospital

- Masterplanning is underway for the redevelopment of the Rockhampton Hospital. We will do the full and proper work to secure the future of this essential health service.
- Work is progressing for a new Cardiac Hybrid Theatre at Rockhampton Hospital to provide more services closer to home and attract a sustainable cardiac health practice to the region.
- ✓ Delivering expanded hospital support facilities at the vacated Central Queensland University City Campus site on Canning Street, Rockhampton.

Mental Health

- ✓ More beds for Rockhampton through a nine-bed expansion of the adult mental health unit.
- ✓ A new six bed youth *Step Up Step Down* facility will provide 24/7 care to young people experiencing, or at increased risk of experiencing, acute mental illness episodes, to either step down from hospital treatment or step up into the service.

 Our next generation of healthcare workers will benefit from a new \$95 million Queensland Academy of Health Sciences in Rockhampton to fast-track high school students into health careers. The academy in Rockhampton will be delivered in partnership with the Federal Government and is the first of its kind outside of South East Queensland.

Real-time health data

In a first for Queensland, real-time data is available on critical hospital performance and wait times across the State's 25 major emergency departments and seven satellite health centres. Data on critical information, such as median patient wait times and the number of patients who have been triaged and awaiting treatment to start, is updated every 15 to 30 minutes.



Abolishing the patients' tax

Supporting regional GPs with access to specialist advice

We're reducing referral to specialist waitlists with an expanded eConsultant service, helping regional and rural GPs access specialist advice on complex patient issues.

Dialysis closer to home

We've delivered vital uplifts to services and infrastructure in rural Queensland, like the Longreach dialysis chairs, and are committed to delivering even more in Emerald.

The new Central West Renal Unit at Longreach Hospital is improving access to quality healthcare for local residents.

It means so much to people like 51-year-old Darren Amiguet, originally from Ilfracombe, who relocated to Rockhampton in June 2016 after a failed kidney transplant left him reliant on dialysis that wasn't then readily available in the Central West. Darren and his wife Tamara plan to move back to Ilfracombe and commute the 27 kilometres to Longreach for Darren's three-weekly dialysis sessions.

"I have my mum and dad, sister and an auntie in Ilfracombe and it will be good to be close to family again," Mr Amiguet said. "It's been a long time coming and the reality is still to hit me if I'm honest." "I think that will happen only once I have my bum in the seat at Longreach and doing dialysis."

Better diagnosis, sooner

We're delivering an extra nine computed tomography (CT) scanners and six magnetic resonance imaging (MRI) machines across Queensland, to free-up hospital beds and bolster Satellite Health Centres and hospital services.



Investing in our workforce

We're investing in the largest expansion of Queensland Health's workforce with 46,000 additional health workers by 2032. This includes 34,200 extra clinicians, including additional paramedics and 18,700 nurses and midwives.

The new Queensland Government is delivering a home-grown health workforce strategy to train and hire the clinicians needed for the next decade. This means making it easier for students to study, train and work in Queensland, especially in regional and rural areas.

We are supporting aspiring doctors by providing sustainable home-grown pathways in regional Queensland. We know that if doctors are given access to training and life in a regional area early in their careers, they are far more likely to remain in the regions.


